The enormous van containing their household effects arrived on Friday, and we all pitched in to help get them settled in their new home at 2128 Locust St., Long Beach. Until there was a semblance of order and a modicum of com-

fort, they stayed with the H.L. Sargents in Los Angeles. During their first week California outdid herself in initiating them to her varied moods. Sargent & Company is featured in Modern Industry of November 15th in an article entitled "Quality Control for Personnel Policies". We quote: "Most thoroughgoing effort to measure personnel programs covered in the M I survey is that of Sargent & Co., New Haven, Conn., described in part in the accompanying pictures. It is a development of the company's own practices, checked by Herbert Hosking, New York consultant. It is based on a constant accounting of major phases of personnel activities, interpreted in the light of a thorough study of the company's past and present relations with workers and community, and of the day-to-day facts of industrial life, such as the status of collective bargaining and factors outside the plant which may affect employees". Under each of the nine pictures (one of which shows President C. Forbes Sargent and Vice President Herman R. Giese checking the record) is a brief description of the step illustrated. Under the title "How Sargent Does It" are five paragraphs of further description and summary. Evidence of the success of the plan is the reduction in employee or labor "turnover" since the war (comment by ye editor).
