OWEN SARGENT, THE FIRST CHILD OF THOMAS OWEN AND KATHRYN TULLOCH SARGENT, WAS BORN ON THURSDAY, APRIL 30, AT 11:06 A.M., IN THE GRACE NEW HAVEN COMMUNITY HOSPITAL IN NEW HAVEN. HE WEIGHED 5 LBS., 14 OZ., MEASURED 18.7 IN LENGTH, AND HAS LIGHT BROWN HAIR. BECAUSE OF SOME DIFFICULTY THE BABY WAS KEPT IN AN INCUBATOR FOR ABOUT TEN DAYS. HE IS A GRANDSON OF THOMAS DENNY AND ELIZABETH (LIB) OWEN SARGENT, A GREATGRANDSON OF JOSEPH DENNY SARGENT (1860-1936), AND IS THE 57TH GREAT-GRANDCHILD OF JOSEPH BRADFORD SARGENT (1822-1907). HE HAS THE DISTINCTION OF BEING THE YOUNGEST STOCKHOLDER OF SARGENT & COMPANY. THE THOMAS OWEN SARGENTS ARE LIVING AT 26 ASHMUN STREET, NEW HAVEN, WHILE TOM IS STUDYING IN THE BERKELEY DIVINITY SCHOOL.

SAMUEL FISHER (TERRY) BABBITT, SON OF MARGARET (PEGGY) FISHER BABBITT, NOW OF WASHINGTON, D.C., IS ENGAGED TO BE MARRIED TO MISS NATALIE ZANE MOORE, DAUGHTER OF MR. AND MRS. RALPH ZANE MOORE OF SHAKER HEIGHTS, CLEVELAND, OHIO. NATALIE GRADUATED FROM THE LAUREL SCHOOL FOR GIRLS IN 1950 AND IS NOW FINISHING HER JUNIOR YEAR AT SMITH COLLEGE, MAJORING IN ART. TERRY GRADUATED FROM POMFRET SCHOOL IN 1946, WHEN HE ENTERED YALE. AT THE END OF HIS SOPHOMORE YEAR HE ENLISTED IN THE ARMY FOR TWO YEARS. BECAUSE OF THE OUTBREAK OF THE KOREAN WAR HE REMAINED IN THE ARMY A THIRD YEAR. FOR GALLANTRY IN ACTION IN KOREA HE WAS AWARDED THE SILVER STAR. HE WAS A MASTER SERGEANT IN THE INFANTRY. A COPY OF THE CITATION ACCOMPANYING THE AWARD APPEARED IN SARGENTRIVIA OF DECEMBER 20, 1951. AFTER HIS DISCHARGE FROM THE ARMY IN SEPTEMBER 1951 HE RETURNED TO YALE AS A JUNIOR. HE IS TO GRADUATE IN JUNE. HE HAS BEEN PRESIDENT OF THE YALE GLEE CLUB AND A MEMBER OF THE WHIFFENPOOFS, ALSO A MEMBER OF THE TORCH HONOR SOCIETY AND OF ST. ANTHONY HALL. THE WEDDING IS PLANNED FOR JUNE, 1954.

HENRY J. WISER, HUSBAND OF DOROTHY SARGENT WISER, WAS LAID UP MOST ALL LAST WINTER, SPEND-ING NEARLY THREE MONTHS IN THE HOSPITAL AND UNDERGOING SEVERAL OPERATIONS. HE IS NOW AT HOME, STRUGGLING TO GET BACK THE POUNDAGE HE LOST DURING HIS ILLNESS. THE WISERS LIVE AT 25 COULSON AVENUE, TORONTO, CANADA.

STEVIA WARREN SARGENT, DAUGHTER OF J. WEIR SARGENT, IS MAJORING IN SOCIOLOGY AT MOUNT HOLYOKE COLLEGE. HER CHIEF EXTRA CURRICULUM ACTIVITY HAS BEEN IN WRITING MUSIC FOR CLASS AND COLLEGE SHOWS AND DIRECTING THE SINGING, IN ALL OF WHICH SHE HAS BEEN VERY SUCCESSFUL. SHE WROTE RECENTLY TO YE EDITORS: "PHE'S (HER SISTER PHEBE HARDING) BABY, EDITH, IS AS CUTE AS MOST BABIES, ALTHOUGH I MUST ADMIT THAT BEING PREJUDICED, I THINK SHE'S CUTER. ANN TAKES GREAT DELIGHT IN FEEDING HER, AND HAS GIVEN HER A BIG MUSICAL TEDDY—BEAR WHICH ANNE INSISTS MUST RESIDE WITH EDITH IN THE CRIB AT ALL TIMES. THIS SUMMER I AM PLANNING TO GO TO A GIRLS' CAMP IN MAINE, TEACHING CANOEING. THIS ISN'T PARTICULARLY IDEAL AS FAR AS I'M CONCERNED, BUT IT WILL PROBABLY GIVE ME GOOD EXPERIENCE IN DEALING WITH PEOPLE, BESIDES A HEALTHY SUMMER LIFE."

JOHN W. BARNETT, HUSBAND OF ELIZABETH (BETSY) SARGENT, EXPECTS TO GRADUATE FROM THE HARVARD LAW SCHOOL IN JUNE AND THEN TO ENTER THE EMPLOYMENT OF THE LAW FIRM OF WIGGIN & DANA OF NEW HAVEN.

MARIAN R. HOLLAND, DAUGHTER OF LEICESTER B. HOLLAND, WROTE A LETTER TO HER MOTHER, LOUISE ADAMS HOLLAND, ON JANUARY 14 FROM THE AMERICAN SCHOOL OF CLASSICAL STUDIES, ATHENS, GREECE, WHERE MARIAN IS A FULBRIGHT STUDENT IN ARCHAEOLOGY. THE FIRST PORTION OF THE LETTER APPEARED IN SARGENT-RIVIA OF APRIL 22. THE FOLLOWING IS THE CONCLUDING PORTION, DESCRIBING THE CRAC DES CHEVALIERS AND A VISIT TO CYPRUS.

"IT WAS WITH CONSIDERABLE TREPIDATION THAT WE ENTERED THE SYRIAN STATION. HOWEVER, WE WERE GREETED IN PRETTY GOOD, THOUGH PROBABLY SELF-TAUGHT, ENGLISH BY A VERY ATTRACTIVE BLOND, GREY-EYED SOLDIER WHO TOLD US THE CRAC WAS 'A MIGHTY WORK' AND ASKED US PLEASE NOT TO TAKE PICTURES OF NATIVE LIFE, AS THE GUARD WOULD TELEPHONE HIM IF WE DID. HE INSISTED THAT WE TAKE TWO PIECES OF CANDY APIECE, AND HE SAID HE HOPED HE WOULD BE THERE WHEN WE RETURNED. AS GUARDIN SAID, 'NOT A CENT AND TWO CHOCOLATES'.

"A FEW MILES FURTHER ON WE TURNED OFF ON A DIRT ROAD. THERE WAS A SMALL POLICE HUT THERE AND AN ARAB ASKED OUR DRIVER IF HE COULD HITCH A RIDE WITH US. HE GOT IN THE FRONT SEAT, BLACK KEFFIEH, LONG ROBES AND ALL, AND WE TOOK HIM RIGHT TO QALAT EL HOSN WHICH IS THE ARAB VILLAGE JUST BELOW THE CASTLE. STRETCHING NORTH AND SOUTH TO THE EAST OF THE CRAC IS THE FERTILE PLAIN OF BOUGEIA, WHICH SUPPORTED THE CRUSADERS GUARDING THE ROAD TO HOMS, AND PROBABLY PROVIDED SUPPLIES FOR OTHER ARMIES AS WELL. THE CRAC APPEARS FROM QUITE A DISTANCE, LOOKING VERY SQUAT AND SOLID, BUT NOT PARTICULARLY HIGH. IT IS ONLY WHEN YOU GET THERE THAT YOU REALIZE IT COMMANDS AN AREA OF TREMENDOUS EXTENT IN ALL DIRECTIONS, WITH THE MOUNTAINS AND LEBANON TO THE SOUTH AND WEST AND THE LAKE OF HOMS SHOWING TO THE EAST. THE LAST SEVEN KILOMETERS WERE ON A BRANCH ROAD, WELL BUILT BUT PAVED WITH BROKEN ROCKS THE SIZE OF YOUR FIST, DARK BROWN, BETWEEN DARK FIELDS SPARSELY COVERED WITH GRASS. THE HILLSIDES SEEM TO BE RESERVED FOR GRAZING, THE VALLEY IRRIGATED AND PLANTED. THE LAST SIX PICTURES ON THE BA'ALBEK ROLL ARE OF THE CRAC AND MAY GIVE YOU SOME IDEA OF WHAT IT IS LIKE. IT IS A VERY LARGE AND COMPLICATED AFFAIR, WITH TWO RINGS OF WALLS AND TOWERS, VERY WELL PRESERVED. IT WAS BUILT BY THE KNIGHTS OF ST. JOHN IN 1140 AND HELD BY THEM UNTIL 1270, THOUGH FREQUENTLY ATTACKED. THE ARABS MADE

SOME REPAIRS AND ADDITIONS, BUT WHEN THE FRENCH CLEARED THE MODERN VILLAGE OUT OF IT IN THE EARLY THIRTIES THEY HAD VERY LITTLE REPAIR WORK TO DO EXCEPT FOR A FEW ROOFS. WE RETURNED TO THE SYRIAN BORDER, STILL NOT SURE WE WOULD GET BY FOR NOTHING, BUT HAD ONLY A PLEASANT DISCUSSION OF MONEY VERSUS RELIGION AS A MOTIVE FOR WAR-STILL PERTINENT IN SYRIA-AND AN OFFER OF TEA OR COFFEE. THAT WAS THE HIGH SPOT FOR ME, THE NEXT DAY SEEING US OFF BY PLANE FOR CYPRUS.

"WE ARRIVED IN NICOSIA SATURDAY NIGHT, TOO LATE TO DO MORE THAN LOCATE THE CATHOLIC CHURCH FOR ROSEMARY. THE NEXT MORNING, HOWEVER, I TELEPHONED MR. MEGAW, THE DIRECTOR OF THE MUSEUM. HE HAD SOME NEGATIVES FOR VIRGINIA GRACE, AND SHE HAD WRITTEN THEM THAT WE WERE COMING. HE COLLECTED US AND DROVE US TO HIS HOUSE, AND THERE WE AGREED TO JOIN THEIR EXPEDITION TO KYRENIA IN THE AFTERNOON. THEY WERE GOING TO SHOW SOME BRITISH ACQUAINTANCES AROUND THE CASTLE. IT IS A VERY SMALL ONE COMPARED TO THE CRAC, BUT WELL PRESERVED AND UNTIL RECENTLY USED AS A PRISON. NOW A FEW PRISONERS WORK THERE DURING THE WINTER. IT IS MOSTLY VENETIAN, WITH SOME TRACES OF FRANKISH. AFTERWARDS, JUST BEFORE DARK, THEY TOOK US TO BELLAPAIS ABBEY, FOURTEENTH CENTURY GOTHIC AND VERY NICE WORK. IT SEEMED STRANGE TO ROSEMARY TO SEE HER FIRST GOTHIC THROUGH ORANGE AND PALM TREES.

"Monday we started off bright and early in a hired car, a convertible Morris Minor, to drive to Limasol. I now have a Cypriot License to add to my others. We drove out to Episkopi to Discover that we had just missed george McFadden (a Philadelphia archaeologist). We ate our lunch on the beach below the cliffs of Curium, which is closed on Mondays, and stopped again to see when Mr. McFadden would be back, but found it was too long or too late to wait. Tuesday we drove to Famagusta and walked almost all around its Franko-Venetian walls and looked at the Othello tower from the outside. The town now within the walls is Turkish, but does not nearly occupy all the space, so that you can get a very good impression of the circuit of the walls, impossible in Nicosia where the houses hide everything from the inside. There are a great many ruined churches in Famagusta, beginning with the gothic cathedral which is now a mosque, like the one at Nicosia. They stand up well over the houses, and even above the walls, so that it is easy to see why they were so badly damaged by the Turkish bombardments in 1270.

"WE VISITED THE MUSEUM WEDNESDAY MORNING, COLLECTED THE NEGATIVES FROM THE MEGAWS AND BOARDED THE PLANE FOR ATHENS. THE PLANE WAS A HALF HOUR LATE GETTING IN FROM ATHENS AND WE DID NOT LEAVE UNTIL ONE, BY WHICH TIME IT WAS RAINING. THE STEWARDESS WARNED US WE MIGHT HAVE A ROUGH TRIP, AND WE WERE NOT SURPRISED WHEN WE WERE TOLD TO FASTEN OUR SEAT BELTS PART WAY THROUGH LUNCH. IT WAS HAILING OUTSIDE AND GETTING QUITE BUMPY. THE GREEK LINE SERVES WINE FOR LUNCH, AND I WAS AFRAID THE INCH IN THE BOTTOM OF MY CUP WOULD SPILL, SO THE HOSTESS PUT IT ON THE FLOOR. I LOOKED AROUND TO DIS-COVER THAT ROSEMARY AND I WERE THE ONLY ONES STILL EATING. EVERYONE ELSE IN SIGHT WAS CLUTCHING A PAPER CONTAINER AND LOOKING ANXIOUS. I HAD SCARCELY REMARKED ON THIS TO ROSEMARY WHEN EVERYTHING LOOSE TOOK OFF FOR THE CEILING. I WAS HOLDING MY TRAY, BUT ALL THE CONTENTS WITH THE PLASTIC LINERS OF THE COMPARTMENTS FLEW HEAVENWARDS AND DRIPPED BACK DOWN ON US FOR THE REMAINDER OF THE TRIP. MY WINE PROVIDED ME WITH HANDSOME PURPLE STOCKINGS. WE HEARD AFTERWARDS THAT WE HADDROPPED 2000 FEET AND RISEN THEM AGAIN IN THAT BUMP. THE ROUGHEST WEATHER DID NOT LAST MUCH LONGER AND NEITHER ROSEMARY NOR I WAS SICK, BUT I FELT VERY MUCH AS THOUGH I WERE GOING TO FAINT. THE PLANE WAS A SMALL ONE, WITHOUT ANY PRESSURIZING, BUT MY EARS DID NOT SUFFER AT ALL-JUST THE TENDENCY TO BLACK OUT. THE TRIP TOOK FOUR AND A HALF HOURS INSTEAD OF THREE AND A HALF, AND THE CABIN WAS REALLY A SHAMBLES. WHEN WE SHOULD HAVE BEEN OVER SUNIUM THEY TOLD US WE HAD REACHED RHODES. QUITE A LOT OF PEOPLE WERE SICK, INCLUDING THREE CHILDREN, AND I DON'T THINK ANYONE WAS SORRY TO LAND.

"LAST SUNDAY HELEN BACON AND I CLIMBED TO THE TOP OF HYMETTOS. IT HAS A REAL PEAK FROM WHICH YOU CAN SEE ALL AROUND. THAT NIGHT IT BEGAN TO RAIN, MONDAY THERE WAS A FROSTY SPRINKLING, AND NOW HYMETTOS HAS A WHITE CAP. IT HAS BEEN REALLY QUITE COLD FOR THE LAST THREE DAYS, AND I THINK WE GOT OUR TRIP IN JUST IN TIME. . . ."

SARGENTRIVIA WAS CONCEIVED ONE EVENING IN EARLY MAY, 1943, WHEN YE FUTURE EDITOR AT A YALE DINNER CHANCED TO SIT NEXT TO DR. M. HEMINGWAY MERRIMAN, OF WATERBURY AND WATERTOWN, CONNECTICUT, WHO SINCE THE PREVIOUS SUMMER HAD ISSUED MONTHLY THE "MERRIMAN CHRONICLE" CONTAINING LETTERS FROM HIS SONS AND NEPHEWS IN THE ARMED SERVICES. THE FIFTEEN TYPEWRITTEN OR MIMEOGRAPHED COPIES WERE LITERALLY SENT ALL OVER THE WORLD. THOUGH NOT TILL MUCH LATER DID I SEE A COPY OF THE "CHRONICLE", THIS GAVE ME THE IDEA FOR SARGENTRIVIA, A NAME I COINED THAT EVENING ON THE WAY HOME. THREE DAYS LATER VOLUME I, NUMBER I, OF TWO PAGES WAS TYPED. SEVEN COPIES WERE MAILED, CHIEFLY TO THE EDITOR'S NEPHEWS IN THE ARMED FORCES, ONE COPY BEING RETAINED FOR THE EDITOR'S FILE. SOME THREE WEEKS LATER NUMBER 2 FOLLOWED, SIMILAR IN MAKE—UP BUT ALSO CONTAINING QUOTATIONS FROM TWO SOLDIERS' LETTERS. MANY REQUESTS FROM OTHER MEMBERS OF THE FAMILY TO BE PUT ON THE MAILING LIST CAUSED THE EDITORS TO ENLARGE BOTH THE FIELD AND THE SIZE OF THE PAPER. NUMBER 3 WAS THE FIRST FOUR—PAGE ISSUE, IN SMALL TYPE AND PRINTED ON SARGENT & COMPANY'S OFFSET PRESS. THIRTY—NINE COPIES WERE SENT OUT.

FOR THE YEARS THROUGH THE WAR THE PAPER WAS ISSUED WHEN ENOUGH MATERIAL HAD ACCUMULATED. IN THE EIGHT MONTHS OF 1943 (VOLUME I) THERE WERE FOURTEEN NUMBERS. IN EACH OF 1944 AND 1945 THERE WERE TWENTY-THREE NUMBERS. IN 1946 THE NUMBERS DROPPED TO FOURTEEN. SINCE THEN THERE HAS BEEN BUT ONE NUMBER A MONTH. THE MAILING LIST HAS STEADILY GROWN; NOW 114 COPIES ARE SENT TO MEMBERS OF THE FAMILY, EIGHT TO OTHER FRIENDS (INCLUDING DR. MERRIMAN, WHO RIGHTLY CLAIMS TO BE ITS GODFATHER), THE YALE ALUMNI MAGAZINE, THE YALE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY, THE CONNECTICUT STATE LIBRARY, AND THE NEW YORK GENEALOGICAL & BIOGRAPHICAL SOCIETY, A TOTAL CIRCULATION OF 126, OUTSIDE OF THE "PUBLICATION OFFICE". THERE NEVER HAS BEEN ANY CHARGE FOR THE PAPER.

During World War II the features were the letters from the boys and girls in the armed services. (Ye editors, however, corrected spellings, etc., knowing that the writers were far from a dictionary.) At one time <u>Sargentrivia</u> was sent by airmail to sixteen members of the armed services abroad. Gradually old family letters and diaries, and historical and genealogical items were printed in the paper, and some illustrations—photographs and facsimiles of documents, etc., of interest to the family.

YE EDITOR WAS RECENTLY EXAMINING THE COLONIAL WEEKLY NEW HAVEN NEWSPAPER, OF ABOUT THE SIZE OF SARGENTRIVIA, IN THE RARE BOOK ROOM OF THE YALE LIBRARY, AND REMARKED TO THE LIBRARIAN IN CHARGE THAT IN A HUNDRED YEARS SARGENTRIVIA PROBABLY WILL HAVE BEEN TRANSFERRED FROM ITS PRESENT RESTING PLACE IN THE STACKS TO THE RARE BOOK ROOM.

YE EDITORS WERE SURPRISED AND PLEASED TO RECEIVE IN CELEBRATION OF SARGENTRIVIA'S TENTH ANNIVERSARY FIVE TELEGRAMS, THREE COMMEMORATIVE POEMS, MANY OTHER LETTERS, AND AN AZALEA PLANT. WE ARE GRATEFUL FOR THE TELEGRAMS TO FRANCES (FOR ALL THE FENNS), ROZ AND HILDA HAM, THE LORING CLAN, HOWARD SARGENT AND FAMILY, AND TOM AND LIB SARGENT; FOR THE COMMEMORATIVE POEMS TO JEANIE AND DAVID SARGENT, STEVIA SARGENT, AND SYDNEY SARGENT; FOR OTHER LETTERS TO PEGGY BABBITT, JEAN BUSHNELL, MOLLY AND BILL MCCANCE, LUD MOOREHEAD, NANCY AND JOHN SARGENT, WEJR AND PHEBE SARGENT, WEJR, JR., AND NAN SARGENT, AND DOROTHY WISER; AND FOR THE AZALEA PLANT TO ELLEN AND FORBES SARGENT. WE BLUSHINGLY SHARE THE POEMS WITH OUR READERS.
